Sevenoaks Neighbourhood **Development Plan Revised Programme**

The progress of the Sevenoaks Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) has been delayed due to awaiting a decision on the Sevenoaks Local Plan, which is needed to establish which version the NDP would need to comply with.

It has been agreed that the NDP is amended to accord with the existing Core Strategy rather than with emerging policy.

There have also been restrictions on referendums due to the current pandemic, which are currently not permitted to take place before 6th May 2021.

At the Sevenoaks Town Council's Planning Committee held on 30th November 2020 the following timetable for progressing the Sevenoaks Neighbourhood Development Plan was approved.

Darent Valley Community Rail Partnership – it's happening!

Community rail partnerships have been springing up all over the UK in recent years, with the aim of bringing train operators, councils and communities together to breathe life back into railway stations and as a way of inspiring people, both local and visitors, to travel by train. The Darent Valley Community Rail Partnership (DVCRP), set up just over a year ago, is supported by local councils from Sevenoaks to Swanley (Parish, Town and District) and by the two main train operators in the area - Southeastern and Thameslink. Sarah Newman was recently appointed as the new railway officer for the Darent Valley line and is working with the Chairman, Linda Larter (known already to many of you as Sevenoaks Town Council's Chief Executive/Town Clerk) and members of the Steering Group to realise the aims and ambitions of the Partnership.

As the 'community' part of our title suggests, we are very keen to hear your ideas and enlist people (known as Station Adopters) to help with all the projects. The plan is to revive stations in the valley

and think of ways to encourage more use of the railway in general. This includes, for example, thinking of how to get locals to and from the stations, and improving ways for visitors to get to their final destinations (e-bikes? buses? better signage?).

Of course the pandemic presents many challenges, but we can come together online and, as restrictions ease, small groups will once again be able to meet and coordinate projects at each of the stations. There are plenty of community initiatives to consider: working with local schools to increase knowledge of - and confidence in - travelling by train; thinking of campaigns to reduce litter or graffiti; linking up walking and cycling routes better to



stations; art projects - murals, posters - linked to each area; and how to make stations the community hubs of the future.

Do have a look at the website Community Rail Network <u>www.communityrail.org.uk</u> to see some of the amazing work carried out by communities across the UK in very creative ways. The Darent Valley CRP has access to small pockets of funding and we can always raise more money together to, for example, create big planters for the platforms, bring groups together to build bee hotels and set areas aside for vegetable patches or wildflowers.

Please get in touch if you have any suggestions - community involvement is at the heart of the Community Rail movement and welcomed at all times. Anything we can do together to support sustainable travel helps.



In the meantime, if you do need to travel by train, be assured that the rail operators are going to tremendous lengths to make sure trains and ticket machines are regularly cleaned, using sprays that kill viruses for up to 20 days, policing the use of masks on trains (with 98% compliance), providing 10,000 litres (!!) of hand-sanitiser fluid at Southeastern stations and even launching an app that tells you how full/empty each train is.

How do I take part in the census?

> it's about us **CENSUS** 2021

The census is coming. By taking part, you can help inform decisions on services that shape your community, such as healthcare, education and transport.

The census is a unique survey that happens every 10 years. It gives us a snapshot of all the people and households in England and Wales - the most detailed information we have about our society.

It's important that you fill in your census questionnaire. Without the information you share, it'd be more difficult to understand your community's needs and to plan and fund public services.

In one way or another, your information touches the lives of every single person living in England and Wales, whether it's through using census information to plan new schools, doctors' surgeries or bike lanes.

Because these things matter to us all, everyone needs to complete the census. Do not worry, government officials

dealing with applications you've made or payments or services you receive cannot see it.

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) runs the census in England and Wales and is independent from the government. Your details are protected by law and information published is always anonymous.

Census Day is Sunday 21

March 2021. You can fill yours in online as soon as you get your access code in the post. If your household circumstances change on Census Day, you can let the ONS know.

Everyone should have the support they need to fill in the census. If you, or anyone you know, needs help, there's a wide range of support services available.

These include a contact centre that can give you help over the phone and guidance in a range of languages and
