From the Mayor of Sevenoaks, Councillor Mrs Rachel Parry

It is an honour to become the Mayor of Sevenoaks and in this Platinum Jubilee Year it will be even more special and so I am very conscious of the privilege and especially the responsibilities of becoming our Town's Mayor.

Our family has lived in Sevenoaks for many years and, for those of you who don't know me, I'm married with two sons who went to school locally; we now have four grand-daughters and I retired early, having taught in several of Sevenoaks's primary schools.

Sevenoaks has an exciting time ahead, with all the special events planned to celebrate the forthcoming Platinum Jubilee Celebrations of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth. The Queen is our country's longest reigning monarch; Queen Victoria reigned for nearly 65 years but this year we in Sevenoaks, with the rest of our country, will celebrate that Queen Elizabeth the Second will have served our country and the Commonwealth for 70 years.

During her reign Her Majesty, like so many of us, has overcome many difficulties, most recently catching Covid-19 and the death of her husband Prince Philip, but has also been able to enjoy many happy moments, when she has led us through much happier times.

Throughout our town there will be a variety of events, something for everyone and for families and groups, in different parts of Sevenoaks, so be prepared to get involved. Perhaps there's going to be a street party in your road, when neighbours will get together and enjoy themselves.

There will be also official events on particular days and times including lighting the town's beacon which will link us in Sevenoaks with events in London and many other parts of the country. The Town Council's Website will list all our local celebrations and also many as possible of the national events.

A hint – If you're out and about in Sevenoaks during June's Jubilee Long Weekend: look out for the CROWNS - small, medium sized and very LARGE!

To continue the celebrations and promote our green agenda and enhance our environment the Town Council will continue with its tree planting programme for the Queen's Green Canopy.

In July Sevenoaks Town will be judged as one of the seven finalists



in the National In Bloom competition, the first year that our town has been in the national final! With the help of our partners we will try to make Sevenoaks full of flowers, clean and tidy, trying hard to be the best possible town; so giving pleasure and care to our residents and our visitors. We will be competing nationally, against six other towns across the country, trying to win Gold medals as we have in the past.

The Town Team will be asking our residents and businesses to help tidy their part of the town dealing with weeds, removing litter etc. and making our town look great.

As Mayor my fundraising events will concentrate on helping, in various ways, the whole of Sevenoaks Town's community with a special focus on the needs of our younger residents. There are many groups who could do with a little extra help. and local charities that need a boost

In April this year a national survey found that Sevenoaks was the Southeast's "Best Town to Live in". I think that we can all agree that this is a super reflection of the beauty of our town, the involvement of our residents and our businesses and also the hard work and commitment of our Town Council.

As Sevenoaks's Mayor I will work hard to make sure that Sevenoaks remains a great place, in which to live, work, play and also to visit.



Greening Sevenoaks Survey

Sevenoaks residents are being asked to help with research into the town's progress to reduce its carbon footprint.

Following the adoption of its Green Community Investment Plan on 28th February 2022, the Town Council is now communicating more to the public about the practical local initiatives it is already undertaking and its plans for the future, so that STC takes a local leadership role, providing information about simple measures that can be taken to help the local community Reduce, Reuse and Recycle.

To enable a check on progress of the town to a greener future, a survey is being undertaken. Respondents are asked a series of questions relating to their current position on things like transport, meat-free days, home grown food etc and their own estimation on how green their household is now. Then, next year and in subsequent years the same survey will be run again to determine what progress has been made towards the goal.

Former Mayor Cllr Dr Merilyn Canet is very keen that Sevenoaks becomes a beacon town in 'going green' and asks that everyone takes part in the survey "I am delighted that the town is taking this path to a more sustainable future."

Discovering Sevenoaks's History

Sevenoaks is blessed with a long and interesting history, yet to many people that is not known and so the Town Team has created a trail which both visitors and residents alike will find interesting and informative to follow.

The trail is 'self-guided' which means that users follow it using their smartphone. The guide features a map of the

3-mile circular route and for each point of interest there is at least one photo and a potted history. The route takes about 2-3 hours to complete, and it can be done in shorter stages if preferred. The trail is hosted by TrailTale and is accessed by downloading their app from the App Store or Google Play.

Former Mayor Cllr Dr Merilyn Canet launched the trail saying: "This is a wonderful way to introduce people to the history and stories of Sevenoaks. The Town is 900 years old this year and it is fitting that we should have a simple way of telling the world much about how and why this lovely town has developed."





Sevenoaks is in the Final of the **Britain in Bloom UK 2022!**

Sevenoaks Town Council is delighted that Sevenoaks Town Centre has been selected to represent our region in the 2022 RHS Britain in Bloom UK Finals in the BIDs, Town Centres & City Centres Town category.

Sevenoaks is competing against the following finalists and is excited about the challenges ahead.

The judging period will run from 25 July - 12 August and then we will have to wait until Monday 10 October to know if all our efforts have gained us the Winner's award.

The Britain in Bloom award is much more than about flowers and

aesthetics, it is a key influence on environmental improvements in horticulture, increasing biodiversity and helping to make the United Kingdom a greener place.

The colour scheme and Crowns theme is to coordinate with HM The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Commemorations which are also happening this year.

UK FINALIST

Much-needed funding granted to local voluntary organisations

Sevenoaks Town Council recently approved community grants worth a total of £12,470 to support community groups and projects in Sevenoaks this year.

The largest single award of £5,000 goes to the Sevenoaks Summer Festival which aims to put on its first full show since 2019, after two years when it was seriously cut back by the pandemic. This year it should be back at full strength, and the Festival organisers aim to extend its publicity to support the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, so there should be a longer summer of events.

Two new organisations appear in the Council's community grant list this year:

- the new Repair Cafe which has just set up in St Luke's church hall to underwrite its expected costs for the first year; this supports a key objective in the Town Council's Green Investment Plan where a group of volunteers has stepped up to the challenge.

- a training grant to the new Samaritans operation in

Sevenoaks, so that volunteers can be trained to help people needing support in Sevenoaks Town and beyond; this reflects widespread concern - and a priority from Sevenoaks Youth Council - that mental health support needs strengthening.

The other activities supported include Sevenoaks Society's exhibition to celebrate 900 years of Sevenoaks history, Volunteer Transport, West Kent Mediation, support for mothers and babies, town twinning, the Three Arts and Youth Jazz Festivals, displays by local artists in June, and the Sevenoaks Literary Festival.

Finance Committee Chair Cllr Tony Clayton said: "The range of volunteer activity which these grants help to make happen are a real illustration of what Sevenoaks is about. In these organisations hundreds of people give their time for free to make life better for people in need, and more interesting and more fun for everyone. From music and the arts, history and literature, families and young people, transport and recycling - this is just a taste of what goes on."

Sevenoaks Town Council has made investing in the local environment and making Sevenoaks greener its number one priority. The Town Council's overall aim is to put in place affordable and practical initiatives with long term green benefits for the local community and to support and encourage residents to pursue individually. Sevenoaks Town Council also remains committed to assisting local voluntary groups who do so much for the town. This is achieved by offering grants and practical support where possible.

For any organisation to operate effectively it needs a sound budget. The past two financial years have been difficult for most and there are expected to be continued financial pressures in the forthcoming year. Where does the £1,864,485 Sevenoaks Town Council budget come from?

ANNUAL PRECEPT £1,295,675

70% of the budget comes from the domestic ratepayer's precept (council tax). The Town Council does not receive any portion of business rates or government grants.

INCOME FROM SERVICES

£528,922

28% of the budget comes from fees and services such as community halls, sports pitches, markets, cemetery, and cafes

RESERVES

£39,888

2% of the budget will be from Town Council's reserves. £59,888 supports Bat & Ball Café during initial years of opening, offset by an increase of (£20,000) revenue reserves.

Wherever possible the Town Council aims to provide community facilities at the lowest cost possible to reduce the burden on the taxpayer. At the same time providing the facilities that the community wants and needs. This is often achieved by volunteers assisting in this for which the Town Council continues to remain grateful.

There are some facilities which are not commercially viable including maintenance of public open spaces and play areas and youth facilities, these do not generate income as they are free for public use.




