1. Apologies for Absence

3. Finance Report

Aanya advised that she had started to raise awareness of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math's) while competing in a Robotics competition and was wondering if the Youth Council would be able to support this. It was noted that the Youth Council wanted to support this but not financially. A grant application could be made to Sevenoaks Town Council via its website.

RESOLVED: To note that the Youth Council had funded the purchase of a football table and contributed towards the purchase of an inflatable dartboard for House in the Basement. Current balance was £1,720.10

4. House in the Basement Youth Café (HiTB)

The Youth Council received a detailed report from Daren Mountain, Manager of House in the Basement.

Daren reported that the last few Wednesdays they had seen a drop in numbers but they have seen more arriving on the Fridays and Saturdays. The Youth Council suggested the possibility of a low maintenance pet for House in the Basement, for example fish or Axolotl.

5. Talk from Kent Wild Life Trust

Aimee Howe from Kent Wildlife Trust spoke to the Youth Council about the Greensands project and outlined ideas for the proposed mural outside House in the Basement. The Greensand commons are areas of outstanding beauty with British heathlands which are quite rare; within these areas we see a number of different flora and fauna that we rarely see in other places in the country. The themes that were proposed for the mural are shown in Appendix 1. It was noted that at the next Climate Change Youth Forum these themes may be reviewed to incorporate wider views on Climate Change.

6. Climate Change Youth Forum

A detailed report from the 2nd Climate Change Youth Forum was received by the Youth Council.

7. Christmas Light Competition Report

Manager's Report,

January figures:

We saw 151 young people, 18 of which were new. We had 35 SEN young people, 2 of these were new. HiTB was open for 17 sessions though out the month. 27 was the most we had at any one session. We took in excess of £300 in the cafe in January.

February figures:

In February we saw 180 young people. Of this 18 where new.

We saw 19 SEN young people and where open for 4 SEN sessions as well as 12 regular youth café sessions over the course of the month.

Debbie Bowen has joined the staff team as a casual zero hours worker, as numbers increase with over 35 coming into HiTB last Saturday we do need to increase our staffing levels to be within safeguarding regulations, so Debbie will be a useful addition & brings youth work experience with her.

We were awarded with a thank you certificate from House in Edenbridge at their 10 year celebration for our collaborative work with them over the last decade. We have also been nominated for a community award at the upcoming Sevenoaks District Council Community awards.

The mentor program continues with a core future direction meeting in March at Millwall FC.




22 Reflecting through the 10 years

Sevenoaks Town Council and Sevenoaks Youth Council were successful in obtaining a very generous £150,000 grant from ibstock cory Environmental Trust for the conversion of the Stag Basement to a youth facility.

House in the Basement first opened its doors in 2012 and since then its has seen hundreds of Young People use the youth café either through out reach projects, school visits or events.

It has been a haven for young people aged 11-18 after school and during the holidays.

Though it has undergone a few changes over the last 10 years with new furniture and has even had a competition for young people to design and paint a










How many Young People have visited

During the last 10 years House in the Basement has kept monthly reports on the total number of visitors they have had since they first open their doors in July of 2012. There have been days where the house is shut for events like the Christmas lights or due to the recent pandemic but the number of young people have remained surprising high over the years. The graph below shows the total footfall for each month From 2012 till January 2023. The estimated total of young people that have visited in the last 10 years is around 17,400.





Volunteering at HiTB

HiTB has been offering volunteering opportunities for young people since they opened for between 2 to 8 hours per week. Our volunteers engage with a wide range of activities. House in the Basement have also at times partnered with other youth workers from across the town e.g. Sevenoaks Area Youth Trust, West Kent Housing and Kenwood Trust for detached work.



PEER MEDIATION/RESTORATIVE JUSTICE WITHIN SCHOOLS

Peer Mediation in schools involves the training of a group of students in mediation skills to help their peers to solve their conflicts. Peer Mediation has been introduced into both primary and secondary schools

Why develop Peer Mediation in schools?

- It teaches life skills to both mediators and 'clients'
- It promotes an ethos of problem solving co-operation
- It raises self esteem and self confidence
- It develops empathy and valuing others
- It gives opportunities to young people on how to take responsibility
- It opens discussion on bullying and how it can be dealt with
- It increases integration and social skills
- It promotes equal opportunities because everyone is respected
- It allows young people to resolve conflicts for themselves without involving adults
- Helps create a calm, co-operative classroom atmosphere
- Gives pupils ownership of their resolution of disputes

How does it work?

Arguments that are regarded by adults as trivial, can be very real to young people. For example, the type of arguments that an adult would respond to by saying "Just ignore them" or "play somewhere else".

N.B. The mediators are taught that more serious problems such as bullying, physical harm, threatening behaviour, theft or damage to property are **always** to be referred on to a member of staff.



We ask for a group of approximately 10/12 students who are interested in becoming mediators and whom the staff feel would be suitable.

A one and half-days training is delivered. The first afternoon is **for the whole year group**, and a whole day is then devoted to training the chosen students. A school assembly is then held where the rest of the school learn about Peer Mediation, and the mediators are introduced to the school during the giving out of certificates. The staff and peer mediators explain to the young people how it will run and how it can be accessed.

Peer Mediation training skills

During the peer mediation training, students are taught mediation skills. These include:

- Conflict resolution
- The knock-on effects of conflict & how conflict affects your life
- Basic listening skills
- open ended questioning
- Body language
- Differences between facts and feelings
- Recognising feelings
- Summarising
- Co-operative working
- Empathy
- How to recognise bullying
- Impartiality
- Why not to give advice
- Confidentiality



What are the School's requirements?

The school must appoint a staff member to oversee this project, and this member of staff is required to attend all training, and subsequently manage the peer mediation scheme.

A quiet area for the mediators to work in during lunch times/break times.

A room set aside for training the students.

Follow up:

Each school is offered follow-up visits to see how their scheme is doing. Sometimes it is necessary to promote the scheme to the school again if there has been a dropping off of cases - maybe suggesting an assembly with a role play, or posters to be put up in classrooms.

Monitoring and evaluation will take place by assessment questionnaires which will be given to each school after the scheme has been established. Young people would be involved from the outset through consultation. We will consult with them so that we may have an awareness of their needs as individuals, as a group, and to establish the diversity and culture of their school. All children involved will be part of the evaluation process through feedback and future development.

Intended outcomes

- To implement and monitor a peer mediation/restorative justice project in schools.
- To encourage students to take responsibility for their behaviour and their relationships.
- To provide a means whereby small problems can be resolved and so prevent escalation of the conflict.
- Conflict is accepted as a healthy normal part of relationships when it can be managed constructively.

Conflict causes pain and distress - mediation helps resolve the issues



Who we are...

WKM is an independent charity that has been offering confidential and impartial mediation services to the local community for over twenty years. Our aim is to resolve conflict and the breakdown of relationships between individuals, families and communities within West Kent.

What we do...

Neighbour/Community Disputes

Noise, harassment and anti-social or abusive behaviour are some of the causes of conflict between neighbours and communities. Tensions can also arise from small disagreements which become major problems when left unresolved.

Mediation helps people to solve problems, gives them new communication skills whilst supporting and rebuilding relationships. The process reduces stress, raises self-esteem and empowers individuals.

Parent Teenager Mediation

Parents and teenagers often find themselves in conflict with each other, with many young people finding it difficult to express their feelings. Mediation is a helpful process that promotes healthy communication between parents and teens about their needs and concerns.

Homeless Mediation

Our aim is to prevent young people being made homeless due to a breakdown in family relationships. Mediation provides a safe and supported environment in which to explore differences and helps families start talking again.

Restorative Justice (RJ)

Restorative justice encourages communication between victims and offenders with the support of mediators. It enables all parties affected by a crime to understand what has happened and to move forward in a positive way. It helps victims to express their feelings safely and offenders to take responsibility for their action and its impact on others. RJ achieves high levels of victim satisfaction and a reduction in re-offending.

Restorative approaches are now recognised to be effective in resolving multi-party disputes within the community, schools, families and at work.

Restorative Practices within Schools

Peer mediation in schools involves training students to help their peers resolve conflicts in the classroom, playground, at home and in the wider community. Young people gain valuable life skills and the ability to communicate their needs more effectively. We also offer our service to schools when internal disputes require impartial resolution.

Anger Management Coaching

This is an effective and straightforward method for helping young people to deal with their anger and learn better ways of dealing with confrontation, problems and disappointments. Anger is a habit habits can be changed.

Workplace Mediation

When conflict at work develops into a dispute, communication can become difficult or stop altogether. Mediation helps resolve complaints that include victimisation, harassment, discrimination and bullying. It can reduce the number of hours lost through stress and improve performance.

How it works...

All WKM's mediators are volunteers drawn from the local community. They are trained and supported by WKM's small staff team. They work in pairs, visiting each party separately in their own home to identify the issues involved. They help both sides to look at practical ways of moving forward so that improvements can be made and agreements reached.

Mediation is not a legal process and any agreements are not binding in law. You have a right to seek legal advice and mediation does not prevent parties from initiating other procedures. All mediation proceedings are conducted on a "without prejudice" basis - what is said during mediation proceedings will be confidential.







