	New Beacon – An update was received from New Beacon. It was stated that sports facilities were available to local clubs for hire. Planning permission had been granted for a new school hall. It was felt that there was a need for further swimming facilities in the area.	
	Sevenoaks Primary School – An update was received from Sevenoaks Primary School. New building plans were underway with some funding from the Government. The school would need to raise £500,000 to fund part of the project. The aspiration was for the new building to be for community and school use.



Questionnaire Results

The Facility Architects and Consultants supported by the Greatness Residents Association carried out public consultation to identify what recreation facilities were desired to improve Greatness Recreation Ground (GRG) to assist with the design process. 






Sevenoaks Town Council Sports Strategy Working Party/Committee

The Hollybush Residents Association which represents approximately 400 households in the Hollybush area, has had the opportunity to review the Minutes of the STC Sports Strategy Meeting held on 1 October 2013.

After reviewing the proposals made by the sports clubs using the Hollybush Recreation Ground, we met the Hockey Club and Tennis Academy to discuss their plans.

The Hollybush Recreation Ground lies at the centre of the Hollybush Residents Association area and is probably the single most important area that we wish to maintain for the benefit and recreational pleasure of not only the members of our association, but also for the general public who value the park facilities very highly. We are naturally concerned that any proposed changes to the current status should not adversely impact the local community and its surroundings.

At this stage we have very severe reservations about the proposals that have been presented by some of the current organised sports users of the Hollybush Recreation Ground as follows:

- 1 The construction of a second all weather hockey pitch with Astroturf and Floodlights.
- 1.1 The Hockey Club's proposed location for a second hockey pitch is on the grass area to the North of the Bowls Centre. This grass area provides free space for children to play. Children ride their bikes, fly kites, play ball games and amuse themselves in an unstructured way. It is an invaluable space for little ones who just want to play, and older ones who enjoy their own games without having to take part in organised sport. The proposal for a second all weather pitch would mean the loss of the major part of this space.
- 1.2 The Hollybush recreation ground provides one of the few open spaces in this part of Sevenoaks which the public can truly use as a recreational facility. It is used by thousands of people, from dawn to dusk one will observe the park being used as described above and also for dog walkers, sports training, football games and so forth.
- 1.3 The proposed location of the second hockey pitch conflicts with the much loved children's playground which would be lost, or alternatively need to be relocated which would result in the loss of further free grass space in the Recreation Ground.
- 1.4 The proposed location of the second hockey pitch would also require the relocation of 2 tennis courts on to the flat grass area resulting in the loss of even more free grass space.
- 1.5 The proposal for the hockey pitch and new tennis courts, will take over 55% of the current area, and put it behind wire fencing, providing a rump for the public to use.
- 1.6 A second all weather pitch would worsen the current intrusion of additional traffic, parking, noise and pollution from floodlights. The floodlights would be placed within 20 to 30 feet of residential properties which have already suffered light pollution from the existing all weather pitch floodlights.
- 1.7 The view from the Lodge to the West gives an open aspect to an area of outstanding natural beauty across the existing flat grass area to Knole Park. A second pitch would completely ruin this aspect.

1.8 The location proposed for the second pitch contains several memorial trees planted by the HRA. These are an important part of the local heritage which would be lost.

2 The Construction of an indoor tennis facility for 2 courts

2.1 The Tennis Academy has proposed the possible construction of an indoor tennis facility located on the site of the disused outdoor bowling rink to the north of the indoor bowls centre. The mass of this very tall structure would be highly visible from the adjacent area of Outstanding Natural Beauty of Knole.

3 Expansion of the Indoor Bowls Club

- 3.1 The partial raising of the Bowls Club roof to a height of 30ft to accommodate additional activities such as badminton would have a detrimental impact as described in 2.1.
- 3.2 The provision of a changing area and improved clubhouse facilities which the bowls club would share with hockey and Tennis players would result in a major increase in the number of people using the premises both for games and social activities. This in turn would result in an increase in traffic movement, parking requirements and noise.
- 3.3 The Indoor Bowls Club currently have a premises licence to serve alcohol to their members and bone fide guests. A club house catering for the needs of the Hockey Club would present a very different scenario. On a Friday and Saturday night, numbers in the region of 100 players who presently use the Vine Clubhouse, would be using the joint Bowls/Hockey Club facilities, resulting in noise, traffic and inconvenience to the surrounding houses and sheltered housing complex.
- 3.4 The construction of an indoor tennis facility and raising the height of the Bowls club would provide a warehouse industrial type outlook overlooking the park.

4 Alcohol licence for The Lodge Café

4.1 The Hockey Club have indicated that they would like to serve alcohol from the Lodge Café. The HRA would be very opposed to this.

5 Parking.

5.1 The present area for parking is heavily used by Club users, as well as people using the park to go walking and jogging and commuters. Any extra use would result in the parking spreading into the surrounding streets where there are already parking pressure.

6 STC Sports Strategy Working party

The Hollybush Residents Association as one of the key organisations concerned with the welfare and preservation of the Hollybush Recreation ground, strongly wishes to be a member of this working party, so that we can represent the local residents and make a positive contribution to the strategy. We would be grateful therefore if you could copy us in on communications and also invite us to the next meeting which we understand will be in the New Year.

We would appreciate it if you could circulate this letter to all Town Councillors and members of the sports strategy working party.

3.1 To review responses of Neighbourhood Development Plan Questionnaire from 10% of households.

It was noted that the graphs distributed at the meeting were statistics only and further details would be made public once all the data had been analysed.

It was noted that once all the data had been analysed further in depth discussions would take place regarding the results and the impact they may have on the Sports Strategy. Further results from the Neighbourhood Development Plan Questionnaire can be seen at www.stnp.co.uk (click on resources section).

3.2 To review information about school facilities (pages 18 & 19)

It was noted that the facilities at Knole Academy were being used by several sports clubs in Sevenoaks. Some facilities still had availability for bookings. It was noted that the Fitness Suite was now open and memberships was still available.

3.3 Update on Raleys Development

Sevenoaks Town Council received ten tenders for the purchase of the Raleys Land. Currently legal negotiations are taking place with the preferred developer, it is hoped that these will be completed by the end of November 2014.

Once legal negotiations are completed a firmer timetable for the project will be available.

An update was received regarding the development of the site. It was noted that Barnies Day Nursery and Oaks Martial Arts are still seeking replacement venues.

N Crabtree suggested that the new Wilderness School site would be suitable for Barnies Day Nursery and suggested they have a meeting with the Kent County Council to discuss this.

3.4 Update on Sevenoaks Indoor Cricket School

Active discussions continue with regard to the replacement facilities for the Indoor Cricket School for two options – combining the facility within the Indoor Bowls Club at Hollybush and within the new school at the Wildernesse site.

Glenn Ball has been commissioned to produce drawings and feasibility for the Indoor Cricket School being included within the Indoor Bowls Club and information relating to this was made available at the meeting.

It would be possible to accommodate the indoor cricket club into the current footprint of the indoor bowls club facility with minimal impact to the aesthetics of the building. The plan would involve the loss of two bowling lanes that would then be used by the Indoor Cricket Club. The size of the pitches would be the same as the current pitches at Raleys.

It was noted that the current and replacement facilities were both 'practice nets'. Gavin Burden stated that the current pitches at Raleys were not in his opinion adequate and would need to be bigger when placed in a new facility. It was suggested that the Town Council speak to Alex Farmer regarding the facilities needed for Indoor Cricket.

It was noted that further discussions need to take place between the Indoor Bowls Club and the Indoor Cricket Club regarding any development at the Hollybush site.

N Crabtree stated that if the Indoor Cricket Club was to be incorporated into the Wilderness Site then full size pitches would be possible.

Barry Lamb stated that the Indoor Bowls Club would want to pay a reduced rent to SDC if they lost any lanes due to the Indoor Cricket Club being incorporated into their facility. The Indoor Cricket Club would need to review its contribution to revenue costs.

3.5 Sevenoaks Rugby Football Club (SRFC)

SRFC have carried out further research into the feasibility of the installation of a 3G pitch at Knole Paddock to facilitate Rugby and Football.

STC officers have reiterated previous concerns regarding loss of cricket facilities, green space, too close to pavilion, drainage issues.

These matters would need to be addressed before the proposal could be considered. It was agreed that discussions on this matter would continue.

4. Audit of disabled access facilities and access to sports.

It was noted that there was no update at the present time, however a survey was being drawn up to be sent to sports clubs to research the disabled facilities provided by sports clubs.

The Cricket Club said that they would also be interested in knowing if there was a demand for any particular sport which was not currently accessible.

It was noted that the Indoor Cricket School could share facilities with Indoor Archery.

There being no further business the Chairman closed the meeting at 8:35pm.
