	Apologies for Absence	Actions of Meeting
1	Councillor Andrew Eyre chaired the meeting. Everyone present was asked to introduce themselves and state what organisation they represented. Each person was invited to enter the name and email details on the attendance list to ensure they received the report of the meeting and future updates. The Chairman stated that the aim was to finalise the draft document with recommendations in order to forward this to the Neighbourhood Development Plan.	
2	Notes of the Meeting held on 28th April 2015 Report of last meeting was noted.	
3	Sevenoaks Sports Strategy – Review with recommendations The document was discussed with the following changes to be made:	

	<p>Remove Vine Café project from the document and the idea for the Indoor Cricket Club moving in to the Indoor Bowls Club. It was noted that the provision for badminton, cycling and golf had not been included in the strategy.</p> <p>An update was received from Martin Smickler regarding Sevenoaks Badminton Club. The club currently plays at The New School at West Heath but due to changes in safe guarding for children the club would have to locate to a different venue. From September the club would be playing in Tonbridge with the hope of moving back to Sevenoaks when an appropriate space becomes available.</p> <p>An update was received from Paul Lansdale regarding Sevenoaks Town Football Club. Pre planning applications had been submitted with full planning applications planned for September. The hope would be for 3G project work to start in May 2016. It was noted that the proposed 3G pitch would be in an area of Greatness Recreation ground currently fenced off for public use.</p> <p>An update was received from Trevor Nicholson regarding Sevenoaks Rugby Club. Drainage work was due to start next week. A report was received from Nick Wilkinson regarding potential usage numbers for a 3G pitch at the site. Further research would be carried out and brought to a future meeting.</p> <p>Due to the delays in building the new school site it was noted that Indoor Cricket may have a whole season without play. Alternative arrangements were still ongoing.</p> <p>The recommendations for the strategy document were agreed. It was agreed to have two meetings per year to discuss updates.</p>

Aim of the Sevenoaks Sports Strategy

Sevenoaks Town Council had taken the decision to put in place long term plans for the redevelopment of the Raleys site including the future provision of the Raleys Gym and the Indoor Cricket School. In considering the replacement of the same or similar facilities it seemed sensible to consider the potential for shared use of facilities.

It has also been noted that some sports organisations were either struggling with current facilities and or had ambitious plans for the future which needed to be sustainable.

During 2013 Sevenoaks Town Council facilitated the bringing together of as many sports organisations (including schools) as possible to work together and to consider all of the following aims:-

- 1. To carry out an audit of current sports provision and activities within Sevenoaks**
- 2. To prepare in consultation with sports organisations and the local community a long term Sevenoaks Sports Strategy including aspirations and blue skies thinking, noting flexibility and trends, for future sports provision.**
- 3. To consider how sports organisations can work together to ensure the long term sustainability of current and future sports provision.**
- 4. Research the feasibility (including funding, land allocation, shared usage and planning requirements) of achieving the sports provisions identified within the Sports Strategy for Sevenoaks.**
- 5. To produce a timetable for delivery – subject to other points identified.**

Additional Comments

The new grammar / free school at Wildernesse has the opportunity to resolve the removal of Raleys indoor cricket nets, adding an indoor training facility that would be useful

- a. Whilst my running group may currently not have a significant role to play in considering sports facilities in Sevenoaks in that our requirements are quite limited its role in promoting health and community cohesion I think are growing significantly as the club grows each year on year. My sister club SLJ are several hundred in size. We take those people who are mostly middle aged and unhealthy and work with them to help them lose weight and gain fitness. The health benefits of this are significant as these kinds tend to be high risk groups. Support in marketing and advertising would be a great benefit.
 - b. Recommend involving Kent County Council and Sevenoaks District Council in the creation of the Sports Strategy
- 2. To prepare in consultation with sports organisations and the local community a long term Sevenoaks Sports Strategy including aspirations and blue skies thinking, noting flexibility and trends, for future sports provision.**

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The meetings were initiated to share topics and issues of common interest, learn from each other and more about each other, network, and be informed about Sevenoaks Town Council's future requirements particularly in relation to the proposed closure of Raleys Gym and the Indoor Cricket School.

Those attending the meetings were encouraged to spread the word about the Sevenoaks Sports Strategy and encourage others to become involved.

In addition people were encouraged between to meet up informally and discuss how organisations could work together to ensure that sports provision in Sevenoaks remained sustainable.
Notes of the meetings were taken and distributed to all who had registered an interest in receiving the information.

A questionnaire was created and the incoming data compiled and distributed again to all interested in receiving the information.

The findings from all of the above have been put together to form this draft document which will then be distributed for further consultation.

It was noted that the graphs distributed at the meeting were statistics only and further details would be made public once all the data had been analysed.

It was noted that once all the data had been analysed further in depth discussions would take place regarding the results and the impact they may have on the Sports Strategy. Further results from the Neighbourhood Development Plan Questionnaire can be seen at www.stnp.co.uk (click on resources section).

3.2 To review information about school facilities (pages 18 & 19)

It was noted that the facilities at Knole Academy were being used by several sports clubs in Sevenoaks. Some facilities still had availability for bookings. It was noted that the Fitness Suite was now open and memberships was still available.

3.3 Update on Raleys Development

Sevenoaks Town Council received ten tenders for the purchase of the Raleys Land. Currently legal negotiations are taking place with the preferred developer, it is hoped that these will be completed by the end of November 2014.

Once legal negotiations are completed a firmer timetable for the project will be available.

An update was received regarding the development of the site. It was noted that Barnies Day Nursery and Oaks Martial Arts are still seeking replacement venues.

N Crabtree suggested that the new Wilderness School site would be suitable for Barnies Day Nursery and suggested they have a meeting with the Kent County Council to discuss this.

3.4 Update on Sevenoaks Indoor Cricket School

Active discussions continue with regard to the replacement facilities for the Indoor Cricket School for two options – combining the facility within the Indoor Bowls Club at Hollybush and within the new school at the Wildernessee site.

Glenn Ball has been commissioned to produce drawings and feasibility for the Indoor Cricket School being included within the Indoor Bowls Club and information relating to this was made available at the meeting.

It would be possible to accommodate the indoor cricket club into the current footprint of the indoor bowls club facility with minimal impact to the aesthetics of the building. The plan would involve the loss of two bowling lanes that would then be used by the Indoor Cricket Club. The size of the pitches would be the same as the current pitches at Raleys.

It was noted that the current and replacement facilities were both 'practice nets'. Gavin Burden stated that the current pitches at Raleys were not in his opinion adequate and would need to be bigger when placed in a new facility. It was suggested that the Town Council speak to Alex Farmer regarding the facilities needed for Indoor Cricket.

It was noted that further discussions need to take place between the Indoor Bowls Club and the Indoor Cricket Club regarding any development at the Hollybush site.

N Crabtree stated that if the Indoor Cricket Club was to be incorporated into the Wilderness Site then full size pitches would be possible.

Barry Lamb stated that the Indoor Bowls Club would want to pay a reduced rent to SDC if they lost any lanes due to the Indoor Cricket Club being incorporated into their facility. The Indoor Cricket Club would need to review its contribution to revenue costs.

3.5 Sevenoaks Rugby Football Club (SRFC)

SRFC have carried out further research into the feasibility of the installation of a 3G pitch at Knole Paddock to facilitate Rugby and Football.

STC officers have reiterated previous concerns regarding loss of cricket facilities, green space, too close to pavilion, drainage issues.

These matters would need to be addressed before the proposal could be considered. It was agreed that discussions on this matter would continue.

4. Audit of disabled access facilities and access to sports.

It was noted that there was no update at the present time, however a survey was being drawn up to be sent to sports clubs to research the disabled facilities provided by sports clubs.

The Cricket Club said that they would also be interested in knowing if there was a demand for any particular sport which was not currently accessible.

It was noted that the Indoor Cricket School could share facilities with Indoor Archery.

There being no further business the Chairman closed the meeting at 8:35pm.

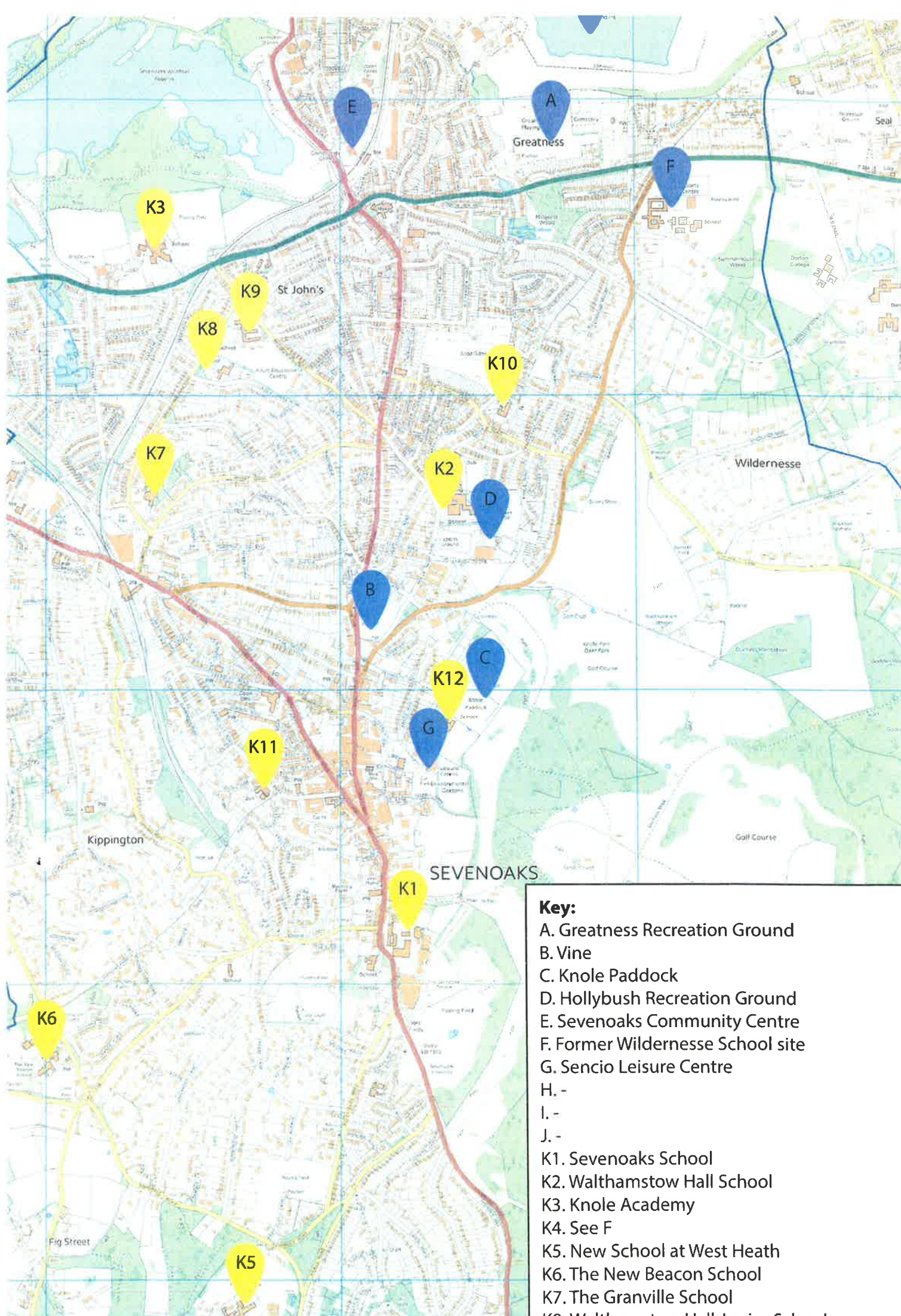

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Historical context

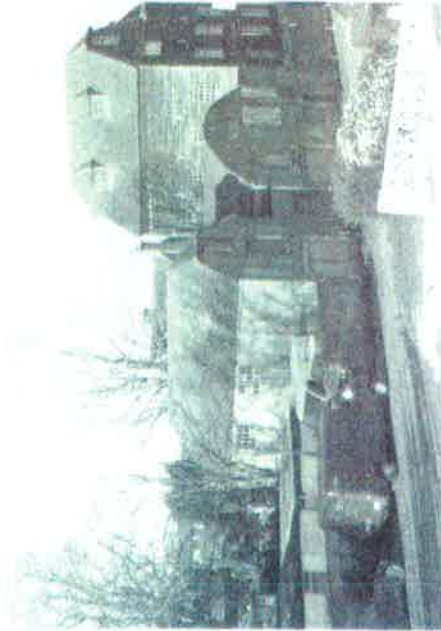
Site Information

Greatness is an Urban park located in the north east of Sevenoaks, Kent. It was originally owned by Lord Greatness until the 1920's, until it was handed over to the local council and today remains an important part of the urban heritage and infrastructure of the town.

Greatness Silk Mill

Greatness silk mill is situated on the Mill Lane in Sevenoaks adjacent to the ground and remains the only Listed buildings within the surrounding area. It was built in 1761 by Peter Nouaille, who came into the possession of the manorial watermill when marrying Elizabeth de la Mare of Greatness. Archaeological based assessment show that there is evidence that the mill to had been operational as a corn mill from the early 19th century with the round floor walling of the extant mill can be dated typologically to the 18th century.

Given the prominence of the Grade II Listed mill within the mod-

ern and historic landscape, it is suggested that development at Greatness recreation ground and surroundings will be restricted in height in order to preserve the visual integrity of the mill within its historic environment.

Sporting History

Greatness Recreation ground is home for the Sevenoaks Town Football Club, which contains remarkable sporting history. On the 26 April 1893, they played Royal Arsenal, who were at the time the only professional team in the South of England.

The team still continues to play at a high level, competing in the Kent county league and have also merged with Seal Juniors at the end of the 06/07 season where they have youth teams ranging from Under 7s to U16s. The older age groups have the opportunity to join Sevenoaks Youth teams where they can play in the Crowborough and District Junior Football League.

Greatness Recreation Ground has a main entrance from Seal Road and a secondary pedestrian entrance from Mill Lane used mainly by the local residents. The Main carpark is used mostly at weekends to accommodate for the Sevenoaks Town Football Club but is then locked away leaving on the secondary car park to be used by visitors to the grounds. There is pond located at the south of the site which has a beautiful sheltering of trees and wooden decking that can be viewed by the public

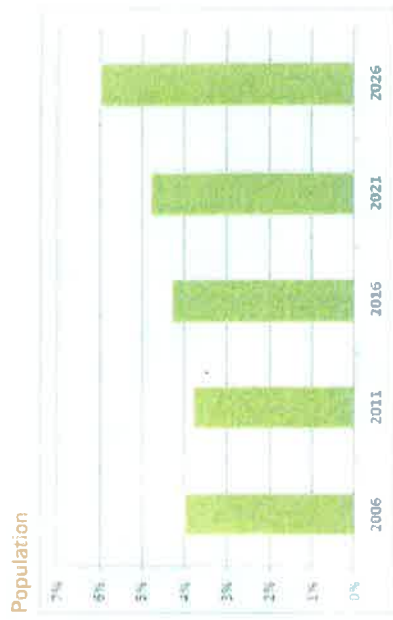

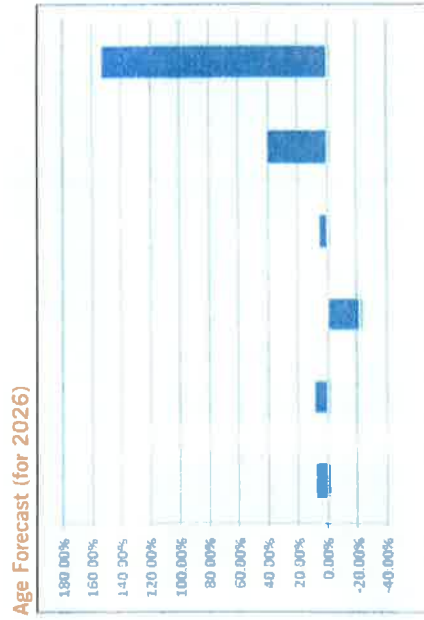

Questionnaire Results

The Facility Architects and Consultants supported by the Greatness Residents Association carried out public consultation to identify what recreation facilities were desired to improve Greatness Recreation Ground (GRG) to assist with the design process. 1	-Spectators, standing or seated, in at least 3 sides of the playing ground.
1.3	-Minimum capacity of 1,200 people and potential to increase it to 2,000 in the future.
1.4	-Ground enclosed by a permanent boundary of sound construction and a minimum height of 1.83 metres.
1.5	-There must be a clubhouse on or adjacent to the ground and open on match days.
1.6	-There must be an adequate car parking outside the ground.
1.7	-There must be a permanent perimeter barrier of 1.1 metre height surrounding the pitch. It may be filled by advertising boards.
1.8	-This barrier must be a minimum of 1.83 metres off the touchlines.
	-Playing surface must be grass unless otherwise authorised by the respective Board of Directors or Management Committee.
	-The maximum slope allowable is 1:41.
1.9	-When improvements are made, 1:41 slope will not be acceptable and it must meet the FA Performance Quality Standards.
1.10	-The playing area must be a minimum of 100 metres x 64 metres
	-The trainers' boxes should be equidistant from each other and a minimum of 3 metres apart. Each box must accommodate 8 adults and have a minimum of 4 metre long.
1.12	-Technical area must be marked out.
	-Floodlights must have an average lux reading of 120 and no reading can be less than a quarter of the highest reading throughout the pitch. Readings should be made on a grid of 88 evenly spaced markings. Lux values must be tested every 2 years by an contractor which is in possession of the NICEIC
	-When improvements are planned, an average lux of 180 must be provided.
1.13	-The certificate must be issued no more than six months prior to the application.
1.14	-There must be a public address system.
	-There must be 2 spectator entrances through turnstiles via a bound surface of a minimum width of 1 metre
1.15	-All exits must be clearly signed.
1.17	-Ball games must not be played on any adjoining pitches whilst a match is in progress.

2.1	-Covered accommodation should preferably be on 2 sides of the ground and a minimum of 300 of which 150 must be seated in not more than 2 stands, one of a minimum of 100 seats. Individual seats are preferred, although bench seating with individual spaces (min 500 mm) marked are allowed.
	-There must be a minimum of 24 seats for Directors/Committee and guests and a minimum of 12 seats for the visiting club.
	-Hard standing must be provided on all 4 sides of the ground.
	-Areas where spectators are not allowed to stand must be clearly marked with yellow hatched markings.
2.2	-There must be 2 seats with lighting and writing facilities for use by press.
2.3	-Terracing must be in sound condition and will not be accepted provided it is crumbling, has grass/weeds growing or loose concrete. Level surface within the ground should be hard standing. 2.4	-Spectators must be provided with 2 urinals and 1 WC for male and 2 WCs for female, as well as 1 wash basin, warm air hand drier and/or paper towel dispenser and waste bins in each toilet, excluding those located in the clubhouse. Individual hand towels are not permitted.
2.5.1	-There must be a separate room available for the Directors/Committee and guests wherein refreshments shall be served. It must accommodate a minimum of 16 persons.
2.5.2	-Temporary or mobile refreshments facilities must be provided to spectators at the ground
3.1	-Existing dressing rooms will be acceptable provided they are a minimum of 12 sqm each, excluding showers and toilets. New changing rooms must be a minimum of 18 sqm each, excluding showers and toilets, and contain a minimum of 4 showerheads, 1 wash basin and 1 WC. A table must be provided in each room.
3.2	-New march official's dressing rooms both for male and female should be a minimum of 6 sqm each, excluding showers and toilets, and contain 1 shower, 1 wash hand basin and 1 WC.
	-There must be an audible electronic warning device linked to the player's dressing room.
4	-A medical room must be provided in the vicinity of the dressing rooms and must contain a bed, cold and hot water as well as paper towels. Reusable paper towels are not permitted.
	-There must be a stretcher available for injured players

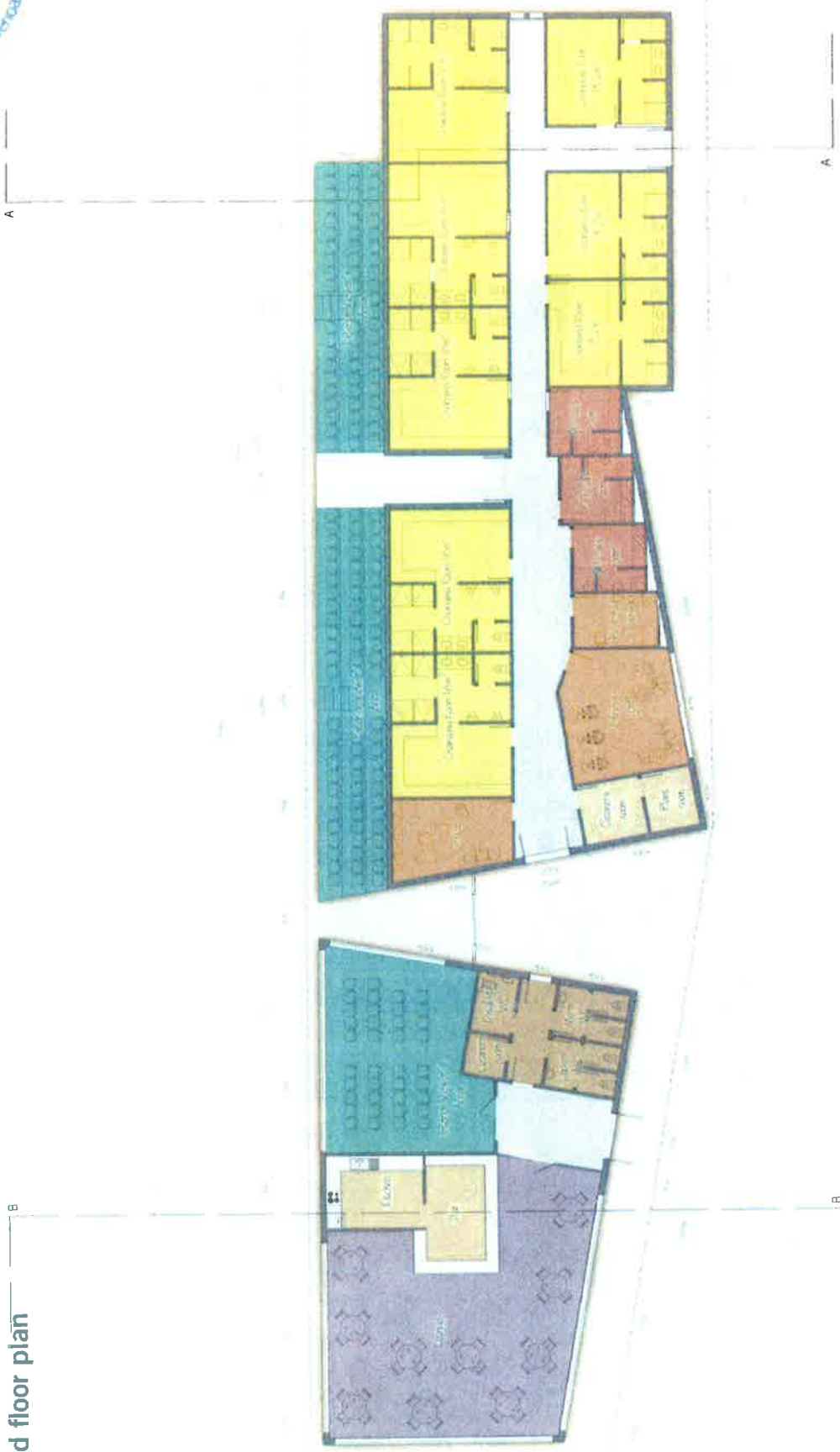

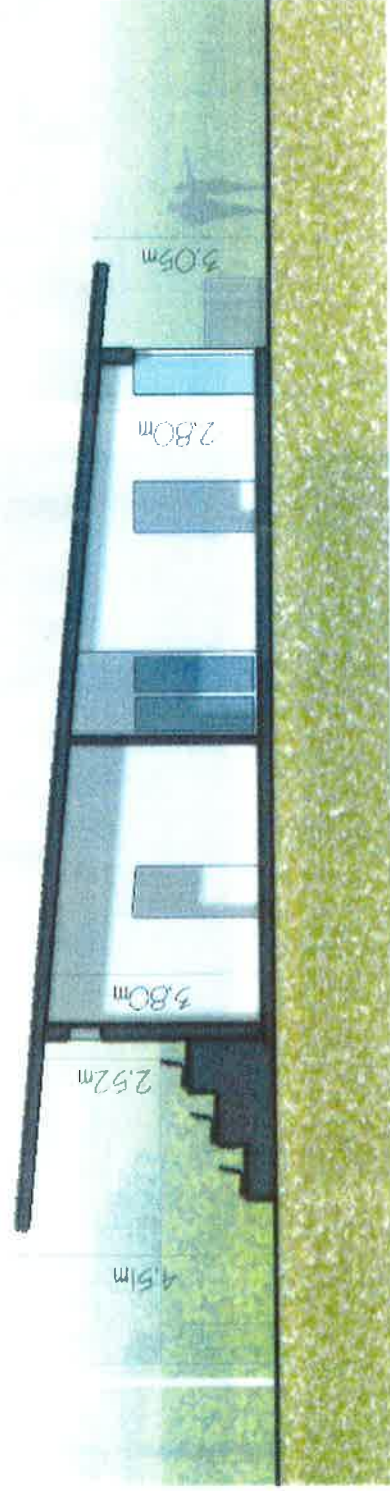


Proposed floor plan



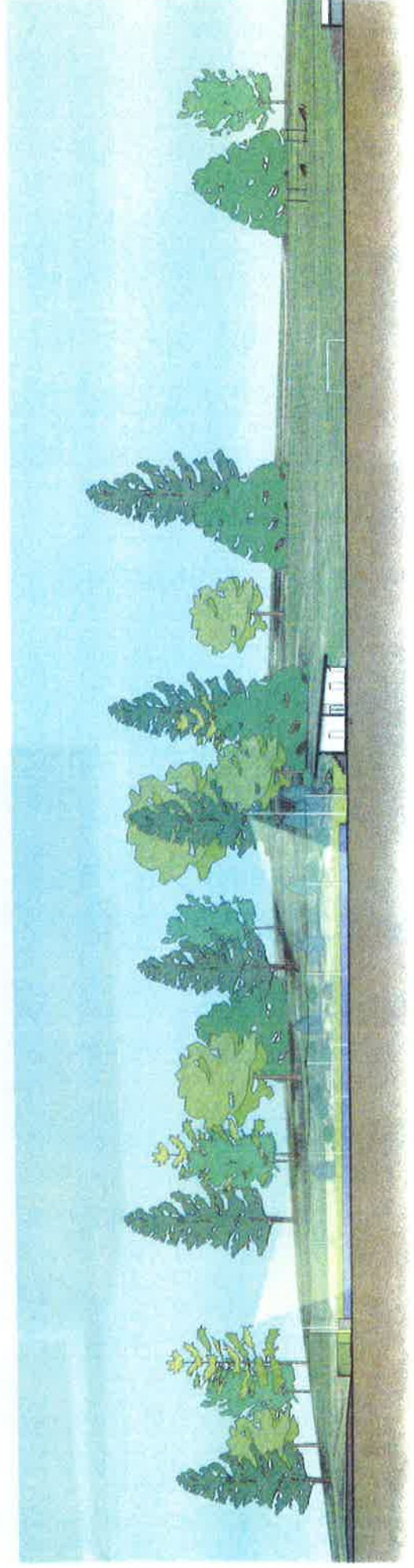

Awards for All England

- Funding size: Between £300 to £10,000.

- Funding size: Between £300 to £10,000. The total cost of the project must not exceed £50,000.
- Aim: Get more people involved in playing sports.
- Who can apply: Not-for-profit organisations, sports clubs, voluntary organisations, local authorities, schools or governing bodies of sport. Not for organisations established to make profit.
- Criteria: Projects must be deliverable in a 12 month period, focused on sports recognised by Sport England and the start date must be at least 10 weeks after the application deadline.
- Deadline: -

Community Builders Fund

- Funding size: Minimum investment of £250,000 and a maximum of £750,000. Community Builders is primarily a loan fund and investments will have a minimum 80% loan element. An interest rate of 5% on the loan will be charged.

Reaching Communities

- Funding size: From £10,000 to up to £100,000.
- Aim: Help people and communities most in need.
- Who can apply: Charities, voluntary and community groups, not-for-profit companies, community benefit society, town or parish council, statutory bodies, including schools.
- Criteria: Projects should complement or fill gaps in local strategies where appropriate and communities should be involved throughout the life of the project.
- Deadline: -

Long-term funding objectives

Football Foundation - Build the Game

- Funding size: Up to £100,000. Financial contributions from other funding organisations are also expected.
- Aim: Improvement on smaller-scale facilities, such as pitch works and refurbished changing areas for community benefit.
- Who can apply: Applicants must demonstrate a financial need for grant aid and contribute all of their own available money to the project.
- Criteria: All projects must demonstrate that can support the growth and retention of grassroots football. All applications must have security of tenure either by freehold or leasehold. All applicants must receive advice and support from their County Football Association before applying.
- Deadline: -

The Sport England Inspired Facilities

- Funding size: Between £20,000 to £50,000 (up to £150,000 for statutory bodies)
- Aim: Renovation and modernisation of local sports facilities between 2011 and 2014, such as building modernisation, outdoor sports lighting, outdoor sports surfaces, community club buildings and sports equipment.
- Who can apply: clubs, local authorities, schools and parish councils.
- Criteria: The project will keep and attract more people to sport, can demonstrate that it is needed and wanted by the community
- Deadline: Round 5 is currently open and closes on 16 December. Next round will launch in Spring 2014.

SE The Reaching Communities Fund (from BLF)

- Funding size: Between £10,000 to £500,000 for revenue projects and/or smaller capital projects up to £50,000.

- Aim: Provide funding for land and buildings projects costing more than £100,000 and involve people who will benefit from the project.
- Who can apply: Voluntary groups, charities, not-for-profit companies, community benefit societies and town or parish councils.
- Criteria: The project must achieve one or more of the following four outcomes: people having better chances in life, with better access to training, stronger communities, with more active citizens working together, improved rural and urban environments, healthier and more active people.
- Deadline: Up to 2015.

Nesta, the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Big Lottery - Redefine UK's Parks

- Funding size: Between £50,001 to £100,000.
- Aim: Support innovative ideas for making the nation's public parks financially sustainable by testing new options for generating income and managing the park.
- Who can apply: Voluntary, community organisations and public sector.
- Criteria: The project has the potential to create a more financially sustainable way of managing parks, is likely to create positive societal and environmental outcomes and has a bigger impact in the future.
- Deadline: The application is a two-stage process. First, workshops held in January 2014 (those who cannot attend them may attend an online workshop on 16 January or 21 January). Shortlisted organisations will attend a practical innovation workshop in March 2014. The second stage will see shortlisted organisations in April 2014.

Comic Relief - Sport for Change Fund

- Funding size: Minimum £10,000. Generally between £20,000 and £40,000 per annum. Grants for a maximum of 3 years.
- Aim: Support communities and organisations that are using sport as a tool for change to address current social issues.
- Who can apply: Organisations, registered charities and not-for-profit organisations.
- Criteria: All projects must demonstrate that meet one or more of the following outcomes: young people lead less chaotic lives, they recover cope and thrive in the face of severe personal, family and social adversity, and they progress into employment, enterprise, training and education opportunities.
- Deadline: -

Parks for People

- Funding size: Between £100,000 to £5,000,000
- Aim: Regenerate public parks of national or local heritage value.
- Who can apply: Not-for-profit organisations and partnerships led by not-for-profit organisations, such as local authorities, charities, public sector organisations, parish councils, social enterprises and community or voluntary groups.
- Criteria: Bring real improvements to local environments by making a lasting impact on the lives of local people and the places where they live.
- Deadline: Decisions are made twice a year: 31 August for a decision in December and 28 February for a decision in June.

Sevenoaks Town Council Sports Strategy Working Party/Committee

The Hollybush Residents Association which represents approximately 400 households in the Hollybush area, has had the opportunity to review the Minutes of the STC Sports Strategy Meeting held on 1 October 2013.

After reviewing the proposals made by the sports clubs using the Hollybush Recreation Ground, we met the Hockey Club and Tennis Academy to discuss their plans.

The Hollybush Recreation Ground lies at the centre of the Hollybush Residents Association area and is probably the single most important area that we wish to maintain for the benefit and recreational pleasure of not only the members of our association, but also for the general public who value the park facilities very highly. We are naturally concerned that any proposed changes to the current status should not adversely impact the local community and its surroundings.

At this stage we have very severe reservations about the proposals that have been presented by some of the current organised sports users of the Hollybush Recreation Ground as follows:

1 The construction of a second all weather hockey pitch with Astroturf and Floodlights.

- 1.1 The Hockey Club's proposed location for a second hockey pitch is on the grass area to the North of the Bowls Centre. This grass area provides free space for children to play. Children ride their bikes, fly kites, play ball games and amuse themselves in an unstructured way. It is an invaluable space for little ones who just want to play, and older ones who enjoy their own games without having to take part in organised sport. The proposal for a second all weather pitch would mean the loss of the major part of this space.
- 1.2 The Hollybush recreation ground provides one of the few open spaces in this part of Sevenoaks which the public can truly use as a recreational facility. It is used by thousands of people, from dawn to dusk one will observe the park being used as described above and also for dog walkers, sports training, football games and so forth.
- 1.3 The proposed location of the second hockey pitch conflicts with the much loved children's playground which would be lost, or alternatively need to be relocated which would result in the loss of further free grass space in the Recreation Ground.
- 1.4 The proposed location of the second hockey pitch would also require the relocation of 2 tennis courts on to the flat grass area resulting in the loss of even more free grass space.
- 1.5 The proposal for the hockey pitch and new tennis courts, will take over 55% of the current area, and put it behind wire fencing, providing a ramp for the public to use.
- 1.6 A second all weather pitch would worsen the current intrusion of additional traffic, parking, noise and pollution from floodlights. The floodlights would be placed within 20 to 30 feet of residential properties which have already suffered light pollution from the existing all weather pitch floodlights.
- 1.7 The view from the Lodge to the West gives an open aspect to an area of outstanding natural beauty across the existing flat grass area to Knole Park. A second pitch would completely ruin this aspect.

- 1.8 The location proposed for the second pitch contains several memorial trees planted by the HRA. These are an important part of the local heritage which would be lost.

2 The Construction of an indoor tennis facility for 2 courts

- 2.1 The Tennis Academy has proposed the possible construction of an indoor tennis facility located on the site of the disused outdoor bowling rink to the north of the indoor bowls centre. The mass of this very tall structure would be highly visible from the adjacent area of Outstanding Natural Beauty of Knoke.

3 Expansion of the Indoor Bowls Club

- 3.1 The partial raising of the Bowls Club roof to a height of 30ft to accommodate additional activities such as badminton would have a detrimental impact as described in 2.1.
- 3.2 The provision of a changing area and improved clubhouse facilities which the bowls club would share with hockey and Tennis players would result in a major increase in the number of people using the premises both for games and social activities. This in turn would result in an increase in traffic movement, parking requirements and noise.
- 3.3 The Indoor Bowls Club currently have a premises licence to serve alcohol to their members and bone fide guests. A club house catering for the needs of the Hockey Club would present a very different scenario. On a Friday and Saturday night, numbers in the region of 100 players who presently use the Vine Clubhouse, would be using the joint Bowls/Hockey Club facilities, resulting in noise, traffic and inconvenience to the surrounding houses and sheltered housing complex.
- 3.4 The construction of an indoor tennis facility and raising the height of the Bowls club would provide a warehouse industrial type outlook overlooking the park.

4 Alcohol licence for The Lodge Café

- 4.1 The Hockey Club have indicated that they would like to serve alcohol from the Lodge Café. The HRA would be very opposed to this.

5 Parking.

- 5.1 The present area for parking is heavily used by Club users, as well as people using the park to go walking and jogging and commuters. Any extra use would result in the parking spreading into the surrounding streets where there are already parking pressure.

6 STC Sports Strategy Working party

The Hollybush Residents Association as one of the key organisations concerned with the welfare and preservation of the Hollybush Recreation ground, strongly wishes to be a member of this working party, so that we can represent the local residents and make a positive contribution to the strategy. We would be grateful therefore if you could copy us in on communications and also invite us to the next meeting which we understand will be in the New Year.

We would appreciate it if you could circulate this letter to all Town Councillors and members of the sports strategy working party.
